A WORD FROM PAUL WALKER

Wait. Advent is a time to wait. Children wait for Christmas. Sometimes, adults wait for Christmas...to be over! Advent is a time to wait.

Who likes to wait? Wait in line, wait for the doctor, wait for test results, wait for a promotion, wait for him to call back, wait for your heart to heal, wait for it to warm up. Wait for your son to be born or your grandmother to die.

Dr. Seuss captures our difficulty with waiting in *O The Places You'll Go*. On the road of life everyone encounters the Waiting Place. *"Everyone is just waiting. Waiting for the fish to bite, or waiting for wind to fly a kite, or waiting around for Friday night, or waiting, perhaps, for their Uncle Jake, or a pot to boil, or a Better Break, or a sting of pearls, or a pair of pants, or a wig with curls, or Another Chance. Everyone is just waiting."*

Again, who likes to be in the Waiting Place? As Tom Petty sings, *"the waiting is the hardest part."* Waiting is the hardest part, especially when you are in some situation that needs help. Lord, grant me patience... NOW!

John the Baptist sent his disciples to Jesus with this question: *"Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?"* Sometimes when we linger too long in the Waiting Place, we ask the same question. Lord, how long? Is there Anyone Else up there who can get some results?!?

And yet, for sure, Advent is the time to wait. But Advent assures us that we wait for help that is sure to come. We are not just *"Waiting for Godot"*; we are not just characters in a meaningless world waiting for someone who will not arrive. Ultimately, we wait for Jesus to *"come again in glory to judge the living and the dead"*, as we say each week in the Nicene Creed. Then every tear will be wiped from every eye. Then all things will be perfectly restored. Then there will be no more waiting.

But for now, this Advent, and really until He comes again, we wait. My prayer for you in the Waiting Place is from the prophet Isaiah: *"those who wait upon the Lord shall gain new strength."*

## Organ Update

It was noted in the Nov. Messenger that the Organ Committee was awaiting the results of the core drilling performed to determine whether it was possible to excavate a full basement under the chancel without endangering existing structures and accomplish it in a reasonably economic fashion. The results suggest that excavation of space necessary for a full basement is possible, although the process will take longer than originally estimated.

Construction on our current edifice began in Sept. 1895 without subsequent major renovations; thus, your Organ Committee, in collaboration with the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee, agreed that now is the time to begin the process of addressing the long overdue restoration and upgrades necessary to keep the edifice of Christ Church beautiful and functional for the next one hundred years, beginning with the construction of the larger basement room. This room will not only house the organ blower, but provide the necessary space to house our future HVAC (heating, ventilation, air conditioning), electrical panels and central plumbing, as well as providing much needed storage space.

The recent meeting of the Organ Committee with the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee allowed an opportunity to develop a timeline for the construction and organ installation that least disrupts Christ Church's daily schedule, including our weekly Sunday worship services, as well as our long range schedule such as weddings, etc. The resulting timeline extends our original timeline approximately six months, with a June 27, 2011 start date. The chancel renovation necessary to accommodate the new organ is estimated to take 20 weeks, which means that actual organ installation should begin shortly after next Thanksgiving, with installation of the casework and pipes completed just prior to Christmas next year. The several week toning process will complete the installation in February 2012. This schedule provides ample time to complete the construction without having to work on Saturdays and eliminates the necessity for overtime, which obviously saves money.

Most importantly, this timeline provides six months, January through June, to run a major capital campaign to defray the cost of the organ and the chancel renovation. Consi Palmer, among her many contributions as Senior Warden, has begun to organize a fund raising committee that will endeavor to raise the million dollars budgeted for the project. Over the past five years, without any organized fund raising campaign, Christ Church has been blessed by the generosity of parishioners devoted and passionate about elevating our music capabilities to a level that makes music a pillar of strength and attraction for Christ Church. More than half of the \$1,000,000 of our goal has already been achieved. Though the price tag appears high, one must realize that our refurbished (totally rebuilt Opus 472-1868 Hook organ, except for the pipes, which are the old pipes, but of superior quality compared to newly constructed pipes) organ was contracted for approximately half the cost of a totally new organ. The approximate half million dollars saved by contracting with Andover is, coincidentally, the same amount necessary to refurbish the chancel and at the same time build the all important basement needed to house future utility replacements.

The following testimonial from our esteemed Music Director, Paul M. Walker, clearly makes the case that the addition of this incredible instrument will indeed enhance our worship experience.



On November 11, I was able to play our new organ up in the Andover Organ Company shop in Massachusetts. Our new instrument is going to be everything we had hoped for and more. Visually it is stunning, with beautifully made casework that will match our current wainscoting, nicely draw attention to the Beatitudes window that it will frame, and really "shine up" our chancel. Although only about two-thirds of the pipework was ready to play the day I was there, everything that I heard was a joy to listen to: sweet, characterful soft stops, fabulous solo reeds, a full, rich "hymn-playing" sound, and an imposing "full organ." Good musical instruments, unlike so much of what is manufactured in today's society, improve with age; over time the sounds they produce grow richer and more mature, and I could hear this in many of the stops on the organ, most of which date from the 1860s. Also, because it is considerably larger than our current instrument--three keyboards instead of two supporting a total of 38 stops--it will allow for the playing of vastly more literature than is possible currently. Many thanks to the church for sending me up to play it. I think we can all be excited about the organ's arrival and installation, and once it is in place we will see worship at Christ Church immeasurably enhanced in even more ways than we can now imagine.—Paul Music Walker

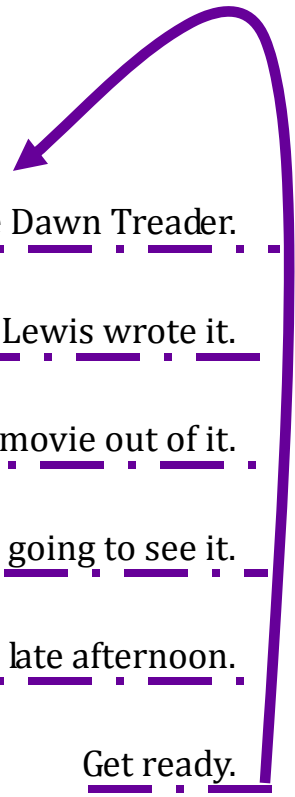
